# Reception

The Reception children have been learning all about Halloween and Bonfire Night. They have been reading the book 'Meg and Mog'.



## Year 1

The children have carried out experiments to find the best material to use to melt ice. They made some great predictions and enjoyed finding out if they were right. We have begun looking at London History - thinking about how things have changed and learning the words past and present. This week we took part in a Diwali dance workshop and learnt a dance routine based on the story of Rama and Sita.





## Year 2



We have written beautiful Autumnal poems, started our new class read 'Pumpkin Soup' and learned all about Oceans and Continents. We have also taken part in Diwali dancing and learned a dance about the story of Rama and Sita. We were really impressed with their enthusiasm and dancing!



## Year 3

We have been practising how to add three digit numbers with exchanging and are getting much more confident with this. We have also been learning about the Neolithic Stone Age era and what the people ate. The children had pretend Stone Age dung and had to find evidence of food that the people ate within it. We found pictures of wheat, grains, pigs and chickens!



## Year 4



We have been looking at various TV adverts and the different persuasive techniques they use. We then had a short time to come up with our own advert putting some of these ideas into practice. Lots of imaginative ideas, well done all!













## Year 5

We dissected flowers to look at their anatomy as part of our science topic. We also visited Lancaster Academy to take part in a 'murder mystery' science event.



#### Year 6

We looked at the life of Joe Clough, Britain's first black bus driver. Joe was an inspirational man who came from Jamaica to England in 1906 and later served in the First World War. Even though he is not known as an important historical figure, ordinary people like Joe were breaking down barriers so that others could follow.
